
Official Founding Meeting was June 12, 2021 For future meetings, we will shoot for one or two in person, and then utilize Zoom and/or other technology for others.

TALES ON THE TRAIL THE LATE , GREAT YOGI 1989-1998

In the Aurora Police Department's K-9 Search Dog Team, there was an amazing dog with a nose. Yogi was a one-year old Bloodhound that was Jerry Nichols partner, Joining the force in 1990 a young Yogi and Jerry started intensive training which included de-snaking and other basic K-9 skills. Yogi's utterly amazing nose really became apparent when it came to finding missing persons.

Jerry and Yogi enjoyed a successful career that included working 476 cases with over 70 different Federal, State & Local Agencies in 8 states. The most famous case Jerry and Yogi worked was that of a missing child Allie Berrelez. Allie was abducted from her Englewood, Colorado home in May of 1993. When Yogi and Jerry got the call. They followed her trail that lasted 4 long days and covered 14 miles in blistering heat. Yogi tracked diligently. They pressed on, only stopping when thirsty and exhausted.

Yogi is credited with having the most sensitive nose on record. He was able to track the victim who was abducted by car by scenting the dead skin cells that are shed naturally and were emitted through the vents of the automobile. This amazing effort yielded results. The five-year old's body was found in a duffle bag in the foothills of the Rocky Mountains near Deer Creek Canyon.


Yogi's amazing search abilities lead to this amazing dog being featured on an episodes of "Unsolved Mysteries" Animal Planet's "Breed All About It" and "America's Most Wanted" as well as several appearances on local and national TV shows. Yogi never stopped working, his keen nose and amazing case work even influenced decisions in Colorado Appellate courts regarding bloodhound evidence. He worked his last case a month before his hip dysplasia and bloat took his life. Yogi received several awards over the years for his distinguished service on the force and is memorialized on a plaque at the Aurora Police Department. His unbelievable 14-mile record for tracking a victim of an auto abduction still stands to this day.

TO CRATE, OR NOT TO CRATE THAT IS THE QUESTION

This is one of many widely debated topics you'll see if you spend any time on the dog side of social media or forums. I will gladly share my own personal thoughts and ideas on the topic, as well as some anecdotal evidence and some outside references on the topic.

For starters, I am 100% a huge supporter of crate training dogs, and I have a few major reasons as to why.

1. Bloodhounds, like any dog, can get into things they're not supposed to if not watched/supervised closely. Being crated can help prevent that.

2. One never knows when emergencies will arise. Mother nature can be rather unkind...floods, fires, frozen pipes, etc. Sometimes you may not be able to get to your dog before rescuers do, and they'll thank you for having a crate trained dog.

3. Speaking of being thanked, your veterinarian and his staff will appreciate your crate trained dog should they have to keep them in a crate for the day, overnight, or longer. Its much less stressful to have that training done before an emergency arises.

4. It's safer for dogs to travel in a crate than loose in the car. You never know when another driver may not be careful, and a loose dog after a wreck can be terrifying for all involved, and fairly preventable with the right crate. How do you start?

Well, if you're lucky enough to get a dog/puppy from a good breeder, they'll have started the process for you. Usually by feeding the puppies in crates with the doors open, so the pups don't feel trapped, and eventually closing the door while they eat, and extending the time it's closed in small increments. *Our dogs still eat in their crates.

Crates should be cozy, safe, secure places for dogs, akin to a den. Some like having a bed or at least a blanket, others are fine with a thin pad, or even a Primo style pad. It should be a place that they want to be, and even seek out on their own.

If they're not comfortable with eating in the crate, you can always make a game of it with tossing in a treat, or playing fetch with their favorite toy to encourage them to go inside and work them up to having meal time, and eventually whenever they need to be crated.

Always make sure that the crate is not damaged, and that there isn't anything they can pull into the crate through the bars or ventilation holes they shouldn't have. That can be very dangerous, especially if they like swallowing things they shouldn't.

I understand that crating may not be for all people, or dogs, and that's totally fine. However, if you're wanting to try to begin the process, hopefully these tips can help you get started.

Note: Open crate door. This puppy chose to nap *mostly in the crate. Still likes her crate as an adult.

IN THE KITCHEN-NO BAKE BABY BITES TWO INGREDIENT DOG BISCUITS By Donna Petrie Cano

Here is a super easy dog biscuit recipe that your dogs will love – I know mine did. This recipe is for a "hard" dog biscuit, so you will need a rolling pin (or a wine bottle works too), and either cookie cutters or a sharp knife to cut your own shapes into the dough.

Ingredient list:

- 4oz of baby food (my dogs prefer 2 ounces of the meat baby food mixed with 2ounces of the peas or carrots)
- 1 cup of flour

Directions:

- ·Set oven to 350 degrees
- $\cdot \text{Mix}$ ingredients until the dough forms
- a ball and is no longer sticky
- ·Roll the dough out on a surface sprinkled with flour
- •Cut into shapes and arrange on your baking tray
- ·Bake at 350 for about 15 minutes
- ·Let cool then let the hounds enjoy!

Can store for about 2 weeks in airtight container.
